

# B. G. N. C. ELEVEN DEFEATED FINDLAY BY 151 TO 0 SCORE

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**Local College Swamp Visitors by Huge Score—Team Shows Much Training — Coach Krieger Has Good Eleven.**

The Bowling Green State Normal eleven simply demoralized the defense of the Findlay college eleven when they ran up a score of 151 to 0. This is the largest score ever made in Bowling Green and the largest college score in Northwestern Ohio.

No team was ever so helplessly beaten as were the warriors of the Hancock county college. Bowling Green scored her first touch-down after just one minute and forty-three seconds of play. From that time on it was "duck soup" for the locals.

But local fans admired the visitors for they died fighting. With nothing to look forward to but the ride home the Findlay boys stayed through the grueling onslaught and fought as best they knew how, for they were green horns at football. Every man was a good, fair, clean player and that was about all that could be said of them.

The outstanding features of the contest would be hard to pick out for nothing seemed to feature, every play was so common place they worked so well. Bachman's 86 yard run from the kickoff through the entire Findlay team for a touch-down was one of the big things. Two or three runs by Quarterback Skibbie for 40 and 50 yards and the plunging of Raberding, March and McMann also featured.

The best was the infinitely perfect interference and team-work of every man on the squad. Many times from six to seven men would be running interference for the man with the ball. To the Bowling Green football follower this means good coaching and they were convinced Saturday the Normals have a real coach in Earl C. Krieger.

Not until the second half did the Normals open up with the forward pass game and nine completed passes numbered many gains. The overhead game proved very successful. Captain Skibbie had every pass going true to the mark.

Bachman had his kicks going good also getting 19 out of 22 tries. Almost every man on the "Orange and Brown" squad proved himself to be a good clean sportsman. King nearly spoiled the spirit of the conflict by his actions several times while he was in. Such actions do not win the approval of the local fans. King made some neat gains, however.

The officials were excellent. Jerpe of Kenyon, refereed in fine style while Petrie of Kirksville Normal, Missouri, umpired. The latter was a star with the Cleveland Indians last season. Eckerle acted as head-linesman.

Findlay made no first downs while the locals covered almost 1500 yards. B. G. N. C. averaged a touch-down every two minutes and 22 seconds of play.
